

# Citing Internet Resources

Excerpts from Classroom Connect's Guide

"What do you mean we can't submit our web site to the contest?" asked the high school students of their teacher, a Webmaster in her own right.

"You can't submit it because you didn't cite your graphics. You are in violation of copyright and the contest organizers will want to know where you got these graphics!" "All our work, our time...wasted!" they cried.

Don't want to get stuck in this situation? Then take a moment and write down where you get graphics and textual information off the web. Use the format developed by Classroom Connect ([www.classroom.net](http://www.classroom.net)). If you are familiar with MLA or APA, be aware that they have their own citation guides for textual information. Unfortunately, they do not have a citation guide for graphics and sounds. Below you will find a suggested citation guide:

## **Online Images**

Image Title. [Online Image] Available <http://address/filename>, date of download.

## **Online Sounds**

Sound Title. [Online Sound] Available <http://address/filename>, date of download.

## **Online Video Clips**

Video Clip Title. [Online Video Clip] Available <http://address/filename>, date of download.

## **World Wide Web Textual Items**

Author name if available. Title of Item. [Online] Available <http://address/filename>, date document was posted or downloaded.

## **Email or Email Attachments**

Author of email message. Subject line of message. [Online]. Available email: [student@address.edu](mailto:student@address.edu) from [Author@address.edu](mailto:Author@address.edu), date of document or download.
